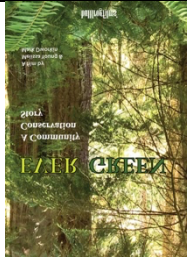

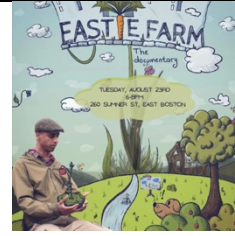
Ever Green

Thiruvengadam. We follow the construction of a groundbreaking geothermal greenhouse from its inception to the opening celebration.



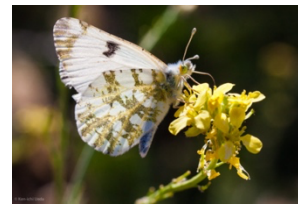
Healy

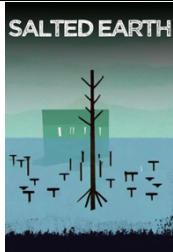
Island Marble Butterfly

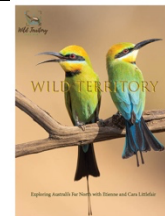
Salted Earth

picture of an escalating environmental catastrophe from rising sea levels and sea salt.



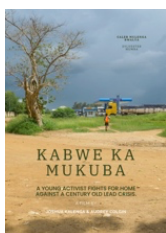
Wild Territory
